Synthesis about the aptitude to command a French International Register-French flagged ship.

I. Reminder of the rules regarding aptitude for command in French legislation

A distinction must be made between the master and his/her substitute as defined by French legislation and the master and his/her deputy as defined by the International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers (STCW).

The ability to command under the French flag is therefore specific to the Transport Code, which confers numerous responsibilities on the captain and the officer in charge of deputising for him, including public authority prerogatives:

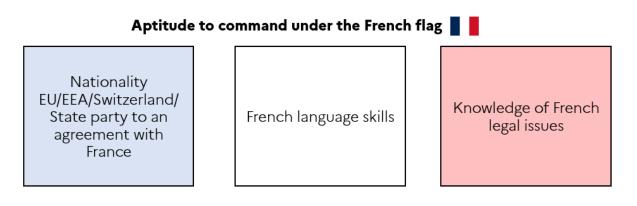
- security and investigation powers in the event of criminal offences committed on board ships;
- disciplinary powers;
- maritime security powers;
- civil status and notarial powers.

II. The criteria for access to command set out in the French Transport Code

In addition to holding the relevant certificates, access to the positions of master and his/her substitute on ships flying the French flag is subject to <u>3 cumulative criteria</u>:

- nationality;
- French language skills;
- knowledge of French legal matters.



II. a. Nationality criterion

The first criterion of aptitude for command under the French flag is nationality. The officer must be a national of:

- a European Union (EU) Member State,
 - → Nationals of the 27 Member States can command under the French flag.
- a State party to the European Economic Area (EEA),
 - → Nationals of the following 3 countries can command under the French flag: Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway.
- of the Swiss Confederation;
 - → Swiss nationals can command under the French flag.
- a State that is party to any international agreement signed with France that has the same scope in terms of the right to reside and work.
 - → Nationals of the following 7 countries can command under the French flag: Benin, Burkina Faso, Congo, Ivory Coast, Niger, Togo and Tunisia.

II. b. French language skills criterion

The ability to command under the French flag implies knowledge of the French language.

This knowledge is verified in 3 ways. The officer must present:

- either a French secondary or higher education diploma;
 - → example: baccalauréat diploma or 1st class diploma of higher studies in the merchant navy (DEO1MM) awarded by the French Maritime Academy (ENSM).
- or a certificate less than 1 year old attesting to a B2 level of proficiency as defined by the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages;
- or a certificate of passing the exam of the national jury responsible for evaluating the knowledge of French language and legal matters of officers intending to command (or their substitute) French flagged ships.

II. c. Knowledge of French legal matters criterion

The aptitude to command under the French flag implies knowledge of French legal matters.

This knowledge is verified in 4 ways. The officer must present:

- either a certificate of successful completion of the national bridge 1 exam (*« module national pont/NP-1* » in French);
- or any French higher education diploma certifying training relating to the powers and prerogatives of public authority conferred on the master of a ship flying the French flag (e.g. a diploma issued by the French Maritime Academy ENSM);
- or a certificate of successful completion of the tests leading to such training, approved under the conditions governing the approval of providers of maritime vocational training;
- or a certificate of passing the exam of the national jury responsible for evaluating the knowledge of French language and legal matters of officers intending to command (or their substitute) French flagged ships.

Is an officer of French nationality automatically qualified to command a ship under the French flag?

No, because nationality is only 1 of the 3 criteria to qualify for command under the French flag. Thus, an officer of French nationality must also satisfy the condition of French language knowledge and the condition of knowledge of French legal matters (e.g. hold a French COC).

III. The national jury responsible for evaluating the knowledge of French language and legal matters of officers intending to command (or their substitute) French flagged ships

If an officer wishing to take up the position of master or his/her substitute on board a ship flying the French flag does not hold one or more of the diplomas, qualifications, certificates or attestations mentioned above (see II.b and II.c), he/she may be registered in the national jury.

The national jury responsible for evaluating the knowledge of French language and legal matters of officers intending to command (or their substitute) French flagged ships is organised by the RIF Office.

IV. Documents proving aptitude for command under the French flag

IV. 1. For officers holding a French COC/COP/GMDSS

The level of knowledge of the French language and legal matters required of the master and his/her substitute of a ship flying the French flag is established by the production, prior to embarkation, of a French maritime vocational training qualification authorising access to the duties of master pursuant to the provisions of Decree no 2015-723 of 24 June 2015 on the issue of maritime vocational training qualifications and the conditions for performing duties on board commercial ships.

→ If the officer has this document, there is no need to contact the RIF Office: he/she can be appointed to the position of captain/chief mate/chief engineer.

IV. 2. For officers holding documents attesting to French language and legal knowledge

The officer holds a document proving his knowledge of the French language (see II.b) and a document proving his knowledge of French legal matters (see II.c).

→ He/she must apply to the RIF Office for a certificate of French language and legal knowledge required for the master of a vessel flying the French flag or the officer upon whom the command of the ship will fall in the event of the incapacity of the master

IV. 3. For officers who have passed the examination of the national jury for the evaluation of French language and legal knowledge

The officer passes the exam of the national jury responsible for evaluating the knowledge of French language and legal matters of officers intending to command (or their substitute) French flagged ships.

→ The RIF Office issues a certificate of French language and legal knowledge required for the master of a vessel flying the French flag or the officer upon whom the command of the ship will fall in the event of the incapacity of the master.

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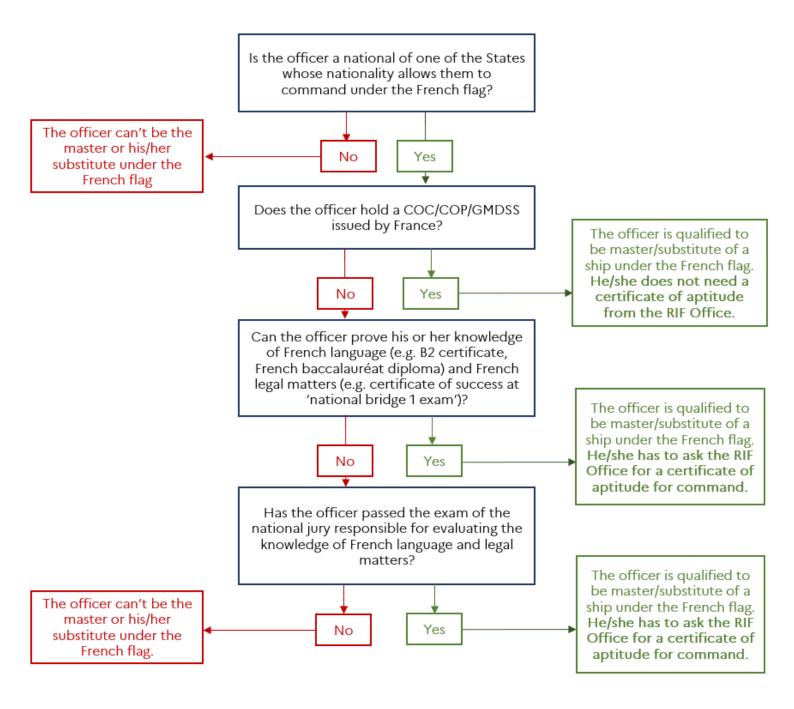

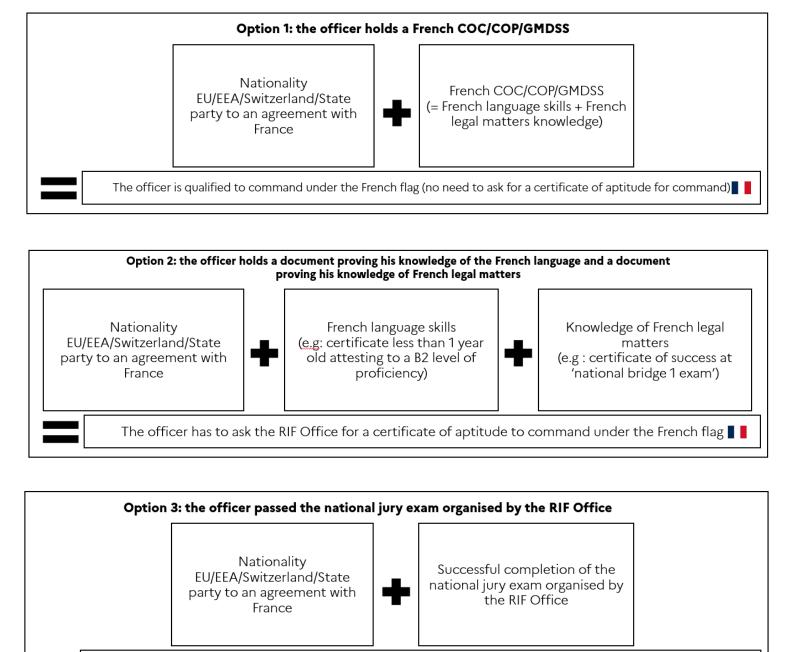
